Part of 'D. B. Cooper' Loot Found by Family on Outing

WASHINGTON—A young Vancouver, Wash., family on an outing along the Columbia River last Sunday suddenly stumbled across 12 stacks of moldering money—part of the \$200,000 that the notorious airline hijacker "D. B. Cooper" made off with more than eight years ago, the FBI said Tuesday.

With the bills now having been traced definitely to the Cooper loot, 30 agents from the Portland and Seattle FBI offices have begun an extensive search of the area for more of the money—and possibly for some sign of Cooper or, more likely, his remains.

The money—"several thousand dollars," according to one official—was found in Washington about five miles northwest of the Interstate 5 bridge that spans the Columbia and separates Washington from Oregon, FBI agent William M. Baker told a news conference in Portland.

Discovery of the money by Harold

Dwayne Ingram, 27, his wife, Patricia, 26, and their sons, 8 and 3, marked the latest twist in the bizarre saga of the now-legendary Cooper, who parachuted from a Northwest Airlines jetliner on Thanksgiving Eve, 1971, never to be seen or heard from again. When found by the Ingrams, the stacks of \$20 bills were bound by decomposing rubber bands, the FBI said. But there was "no trace of D. B. Cooper," according to the agency.

Shortly after the hijacking, a cult sprang up around D. B. Cooper, a name that never has been traced to its origins.

A private club was named in his honor. D. B. Cooper T-shirts were manufactured, bumper stickers were run off and anniversary parties were held.

Baker said in Portland that whether Cooper got away with the rest of the money was an open question.

have believed that Cooper died in his plunge from the Boeing 727 because he was wearing only a business suit and street shoes when he jumped into a howling wind and freezing rain in an unreliable parachute. It has been estimated that he hit the ground at a speed of 50 to 70 m.p.h.

The saga began when "Cooper" boarded the jetliner in Portland for an evening flight to Seattle. Once airborne, he demanded that the airline have \$200,000 in \$20 bills and three parachutes on hand when the plane landed in Seattle. He threatened to blow up the plane if his demands were not met.

The airline complied, providing the parachutes and money. However, the FBI said Tuesday that the serial numbers of the bills had been recorded.

Cooper permitted the airliner's 36 passengers to leave the plane in Seattle. He then ordered the crew to take the plane to Reno and told the pilot to fly at a relatively low altitude and to open the plane's rear stairway.

Crew members last heard his voice on the plane's intercom when they

were over the Washington-Oregon border. They said they believe he jumped, using the least reliable parachute.

The decomposed money was found 17 to 20 miles from the jump site by the Ingrams' older son, Brian. The bills were partly buried in sand that the Ingrams were scooping out to build a fire.

"Here's some more wood for the fire, Daddy," the father recalled his son as saying.

"It wasn't wood," Ingram said. "He (Brian) thought he had struck it rich."

Ingram said he assumed the bills might be part of the Cooper money. He turned them over to the FBI, adding with a smile that they were so decomposed, "I couldn't have spent it."

In leafing through the rotting bills, Baker said, the FBI made about "nine or 10 immediate hits"—matches with the numbers of the missing money. The bills were flown to Washington for further analysis and tests by the FBI laboratory.

An FBI official said the packaging and number sequence of the recovered bills indicated they had not been

separated and "are in much the same order as when they were given to the hijacker."

The initial search, confined to an area several hundred yards long and 40 yards wide, turned up "fragments of more money"—nothing more, Baker said. He said the money appeared to have washed up on the bank.

Once that search is completed, probably by this afternoon, a scaled-down number of agents will move upstream, continuing the hunt.

Law enforcement officials in the Pacific Northwest have theorized that Cooper's body is at the bottom of Lake Merwin, 30 miles north of Portland, or that his bones are so entangled in giant wild blackberry bushes that they will never be found.

Ralph Himmelsbach, the FBI agent who has worked on the hijacking since it took place, said the money probably had been washed downstream from a Columbia tributary in Washington. But he said he doubted that it came from the Lewis River, the tributary that flows out of Lake Merwin.

Some Skyjack Loot Found But Trail Still Cold

PORTLAND, Ore. — Children digging in the sand during a family picnic uncovered up to \$3,000 of the \$200,000 taken by D.B. Cooper in a 1971 jet hijacking in which the hijacker escaped by parachute, the FBI said yesterday.

FBI officials said the discovery of the money on a Columbia River beach north of Portland reinforced their long-held theory that Cooper was killed in the daring plunge that has made the aerial bandit a folk hero in the Pacific Northwest.

No trace has been found of the hijacker.

At news conferences in Washington, Seattle and Portland, the FBI confirmed that the money — not counted but estimated at \$3,000 or less — was part of the \$200,000 in \$20 bills given Cooper on demand after he commandeered a Northwest Orient Airlines 727 trijet on Thanksgiving eve 1971.

A man using the name D.B. Cooper boarded the jet in Portland, threatened to blow it up, then forced it to land in Seattle to collect the ransom. He allowed 36 passengers aboard the flight to leave the aircraft, then ordered the crew to fly to Reno. When it landed in Reno, there was no trace of Cooper but the rear exit door under the tail was open.

The FBI theorized at the time that Cooper, dressed only in a business suit and street shoes, jumped from the plane over southwest Washington during a freezing storm.

FBI agent Ralph Himmelsbach, who has been on the Cooper case since the night of the skyjacking, said the discovery of the money reduced to "less than 50-50" the odds that Cooper is alive.

The FBI said it was searching the area for more money and clues as to the fate of Cooper.

The FBI displayed twelve weathered stacks of \$20 bills during a meeting with the press.

"This clue is the first we've had since the night of the occurrence," said Bill Baker, assistant special agent in charge of the Portland FBI office.

He said wads of the money, bound by rubber bands, were found Sunday while Harold D. Ingram, his wife, Patricia, and their 8-year-old son, Brian, were preparing to build a picnic fire along the Columbia River five miles northwest of the Interstate 5 bridge linking Portland and Vancouver, Wash., where the Ingrams live.

Ingram said at a news conference here that the money was found about 20 yards from the river's edge under a thin layer of sand.

"My son ran up and said, 'Wait a minute, Daddy,'" Ingram said. "He raked a place out in the sand and there it was. There were three bundles" of money.

"I thought it was play money," said Denise Ingram, 5, of Vancouver, Wash., in an interview with United Press International. She said she and her cousin Brian "both found it. It was buried in the sand."

Denise's mother, Crystal Ingram, said in Vancouver there was no bag for the money.

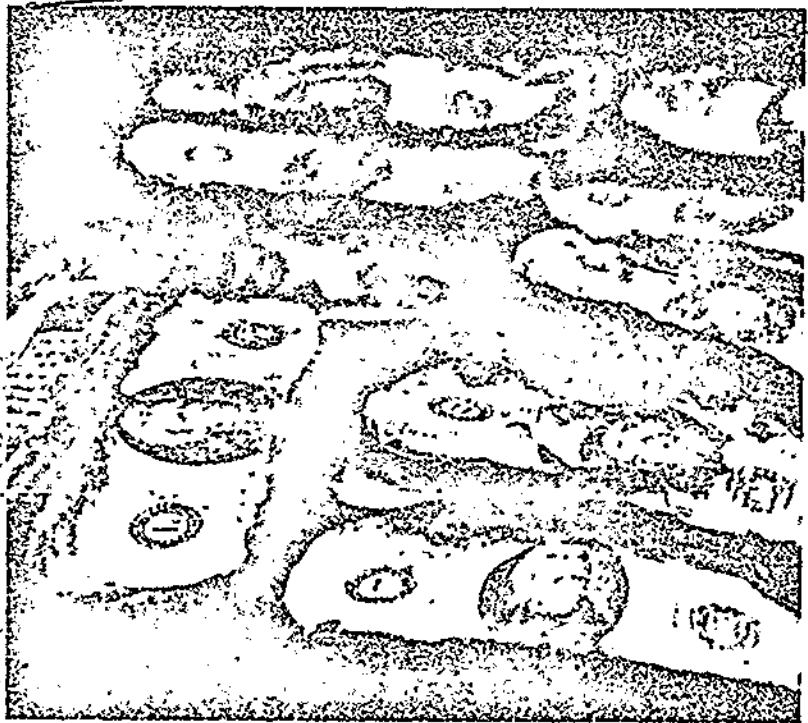
"We put it in a plastic bag from our bread," she said. "One of us did mention that it might have something to do with D.B. Cooper, but we kept on going with the picnic."

Harold Ingram later took the money to the FBI.

Baker said officials estimated there were several thousand dollars in the wads, but it was impossible to make an accurate estimate because of the deteriorated condition.

Officials have called the commandeering of the Boeing 727 jetliner the only known unsolved hijacking.

In 1977, just to make sure the hijacker did not escape prosecution via the statute of limitations, he was indicted on federal charges in absentia.

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — Children playing in the sand along the Columbia River found tattered remains of part of the loot paid to skyjacker D.B. Cooper. The find has triggered a search for more of the \$200,000 ransom.

Discovery of the money was the first break in the case since Cooper bailed out of a plane into a rainy night in 1971.

FBI agents dug up more fragments of wet \$20 bills late yesterday along the river on the Fazio Ranch five miles west of Vancouver, Wash. Agents continued the search today.

FBI agent Ralph Himmelsbach, who has been on the case since the Thanksgiving Eve hijacking, said the finding of the money reduces to "less than 50-50" the odds that Cooper is still alive.

Cooper's case is the nation's only unsolved aerial hijacking for ransom. Since then, 13 persons have

tried the same thing; three were killed and the others were captured, the FBI said. were as deep as 3 feet beneath the surface.

Children on a Sunday picnic found three bundles of bills — about \$3,000 in \$20 bills printed in 1963 and 1969 — "It indicates to us there's been a lot of sand shift there and the money has been there for some time," Nicodemus said.

that were part of Cooper's loot. The serial numbers showed they matched the \$200,000 Cooper extorted from Northwest Airlines in 1971. The discovery of the money was the first solid lead in the case since Cooper jumped from a Northwest Airlines flight after a hijacking that began at Portland.

The partially decomposed clumps of money were being sent to the FBI laboratory in Washington, D.C., but agents on the case were sure all of the bills found were from the loot. The hijacker, who actually used the name Dan Cooper on boarding the plane, told a stewardess he had a bomb in his briefcase and demanded

FBI agents continued searching \$200,000 and four parachutes and to be flown to Reno, Nev. He allowed the other passengers to leave the plane at Seattle where he got the money and chutes. today at the beach on the Fazio Ranch where agents found bits of bills in the same area where the families had found the money in the sand Sunday.

"They're very small pieces of money, about the size of a nickel," said FBI agent Tom Nicodemus. He said some of the pieces of money After takeoff, Cooper forced the entire crew to the flight deck and while the plane was over southwest Washington he jumped with his loot into the freezing, rainy night.

More \$20 Bills Found, Tied To D. B. Cooper

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — FBI agents found wadded up \$20 bills yesterday in muck dredged from the Columbia River six years ago and said the money was part of the \$200,000 ransom collected in 1971 by D.B. Cooper before he parachuted into folklore from a hijacked jet-liner.

The first money from Cooper's haul was found Sunday on a sandy beach on the north shore of the Columbia 5 miles northwest of Vancouver, Wash., by children on a family outing. It totaled about \$3,000 and the serial numbers checked matched numbers on the bills given Cooper.

FBI agent Ralph Himmelsbach said more money was dug up by agents Tuesday afternoon and yesterday morning.

"We have the Army Corps of Engineers and geologists out there," Himmelsbach said. "An agent who was out there said it looks like they'll be able to help us out."

One agent at the site said he dug up a formless fist-size clump of money he described "a wadded up bunch of \$20 bills."

Himmelsbach said the geologists and corps scientists probably will be able to determine whether the shore material where the money was found came from the middle of the Columbia River, washed downstream from the Washougal River or was carried upstream from the mouth of the Lewis River and dumped at the site.

The FBI said it had learned that section of the Columbia was last dredged in 1974.

The FBI long believed Cooper parachuted into the drainage of the Lewis River, which empties into the Columbia downstream from Vancouver. The location in which the money was found indicated he landed 20 miles or more away in the drainage of the Washougal River which enters the Columbia upstream from the site.

Before he learned the shore material was dredging spoils from the river, Himmelsbach said the \$20 bills had been buried on the shore "probably for several years."

FBI agents Tuesday, digging three feet deep, found more fragments of bills but no more packets from the \$200,000 given to Cooper at Seattle on Thanksgiving Eve 1971 when he hijacked a Northwest Airlines 727.

Nor was there any trace of the

legendary extortionist who parachuted from the plane somewhere over southwest Washington, an area of rugged mountains and thick forests where a body could remain hidden forever. Many authorities say they think Cooper, whose real identity never has been learned, died in the leap from the plane.

Himmelsbach, the agent who has worked on the Cooper caper since the night it occurred, said he knew of no unidentified bodies, which could be Cooper, that washed up on the Columbia banks in the past eight years.

"We have kept a close liaison with medical authorities on both sides of the river," he said. "If there had been any such body we'd have known about it."

Himmelsbach said when Cooper jumped into the rainy night he had the 21-pound package of money strapped to him with nylon cords from one of three parachutes sup-

plied by the airline at his demand.

Himmelsbach outlined a "possible scenario" which would explain the money's presence on the beach.

"Probably the money (in the bag) came down close to the bank of a stream. When the water got high enough it washed downstream, bumping along the bottom. The bag finally degraded.

"Perhaps it could have burst on impact but that is not likely. We think finally, tumbling down the river bottom, it broke open and the money was carried on, wearing off little bits and pieces around the edges, grinding it down like it had been ground with sandpaper or a file, leaving the center portion."

The first money was found in three packages, all bound together, by Brian Ingram, 8, and his cousin, Denise Ingram, 5. Brian's parents, Harold and Pat Ingram of Vancouver, turned the money over to the FBI Monday.

Bills' clues may end D.B. Cooper enigma

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — River engineers and geologists analyzing the mud around a wad of tattered bills may be able to pinpoint the spot where hijacker D.B. Cooper and at least part of the \$200,000 ransom he collected nine years ago parted company, the FBI says.

The first trace of the money Cooper took with him when he parachuted out of a hijacked Northwest Air-

lines jetliner on a rainy Thanksgiving Eve in 1971 was found Sunday by a picnicking family.

FBI agents Tuesday and yesterday found additional fragments of bills nearby, in dredged-up material on the north shore of the Columbia River.

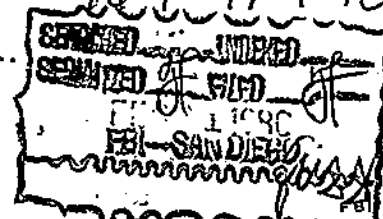
The river was last dredged in 1974, FBI agent Ralph Himmelsbach said. He said Army Corps of Engineers scientists and geologists will probably be able to determine whether the shore material surrounding the bills came from the middle of the Columbia River, washed downstream from the Washougal River or was carried upstream from the mouth of the Lewis River and dumped at the site.

"We have the Army Corps of Engineers and geologists out there," Himmelsbach said. "An agent who was out there said it looks like they'll be able to help us out."

The money found Sunday on the north shore of the Columbia River, about 5 miles northwest of Vancouver, Wash., was bound in packets with crumbling rubber bands. It totaled about \$3,000 and the serial numbers checked matched numbers on the bills given to Cooper at Seattle when he hijacked a Northwest Airlines 727.

The money's location indicates the hijacker landed in the drainage of the Washougal River, which enters the Columbia upstream from the site.

Before learning the shore material had been dredged from the river, Himmelsbach said the \$20 bills found by the children had been buried on the shore "probably for several years."

Search For Hijacking Money May Be Halted After Today

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — The search along a Columbia River beach for more money from the D.B. Cooper hijacking eight years ago probably will be suspended after today, FBI officials said yesterday.

Meanwhile, the FBI said a geologist concluded that several thousand dollars found Sunday by an 8-year-old boy on a family picnic was deposited on the beach in the past year or two.

FBI agents continued to dig for more of the \$200,000 that Cooper took with him when he bailed out of a plane on Thanksgiving Eve in 1971.

The search began Tuesday along the river's north shore, about three miles southwest of downtown Vancouver. Additional scraps of money were found on Wednesday.

A man whose passenger list was signed "Dan Cooper" left a Northwest Airlines plane that was bound for Reno from Seattle after he displayed what appeared to be a bomb and obtained a package of \$20 bills and three parachutes.

FBI agents believed he left the plane, during a storm, about 20 miles northeast of where the crum-

bled and weathered bills were found.

It is the nation's only unsolved hijacking.

"We'll work today and tomorrow and probably knock it off and bring my troops back up here and reassess the situation," said Jack Pringle, assistant agent in charge of the Seattle office which took over the search operations.

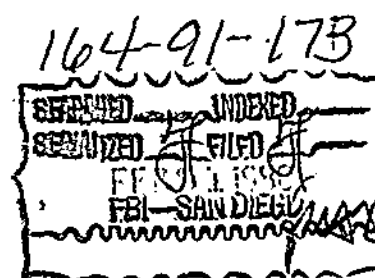
"Some of the area is inaccessible and there's no way we can search the whole river," Pringle said.

He said geologist Leonard Palmer of Portland State University concluded that the dredging operation in 1974 did not put the money onto the beach, because the bills were found above clay deposits put on the banks by the dredge.

Brian Ingram, when scooping out a place for a campfire, found the money, tied together by rubber bands in three clumps, under a thin layer of sand.

The bills were matched to the Cooper loot by serial numbers.

The FBI speculated the bills could have washed into the Columbia from a tributary and were studying flood records.

More Pieces of 'D. B. Cooper' Loot Found

Hunt Delayed by Uncertainty Over How Money Got to Site

PORTLAND, Ore.—FBI agents Wednesday found more fragments of money from the \$200,000 airline hijacking loot of the legendary "D. B. Cooper," but the mystery of what happened to the man appeared no closer to solution.

To complicate matters, agents learned Wednesday that all the cash found so far on a sandy beach of the Columbia River may have come from material dredged from the center of the river in 1974.

"We don't know what that means," FBI agent Ralph Himmelsbach said. "We have the Army Corps of Engineers and geologists out there. An agent who was out there said it looks like they'll be able to help us out."

The first money from Cooper's haul in the 1971 hijacking was found Sunday on the north shore of the Columbia 5 miles northwest of Vancouver, Wash., by children on a family outing. It totaled about \$3,000 and the serial numbers matched those on the bills given to Cooper.

Himmelsbach said a number of additional fragments were dug up by agents Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning, some of them from as deep as 3 feet. One agent at the site described a formless fist-size clump as "a wadded-up bunch of \$20 bills."

Himmelsbach said the geologists and corps scientists probably would be able to determine whether the material on the shore in which the money was found had come from the middle of the river and had been washed downstream from the Washington River or carried upstream by dredges from the mouth of the Lewis River and dumped at the site.

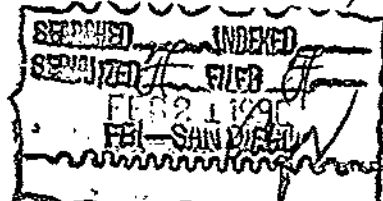
Until such a determination is made, agents planned no widespread search of wooded areas connected to the river by streams.

A man who signed in as Dan Cooper left Portland, Ore., on Thanksgiving eve in 1971 aboard a Northwest Airlines jet. Once the flight was in the air, the hijacker displayed what appeared to be a bomb and demanded \$200,000 and parachutes.

The passengers and two flight at-

tendants were let off in Seattle and the remainder of the crew was locked in the cockpit. Somewhere over southwest Washington, the man who has come to be known as "D.B. Cooper" disappeared out the back entrance with the money and a parachute.

The incident is the only unsolved hijacking in the nation.

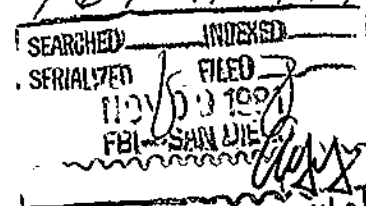

On November 24, 1971, a lone white male boarded Northwest Orient Flight #305 at Portland, Oregon. At approximately 3:22 PM while the flight was en route to Seattle, Washington, he indicated to the stewardess that his briefcase contained a bomb which would blow up the plane unless his demands were met.

The hijacker demanded \$200,000 and four parachutes in exchange for the safety of the 36 passengers aboard the plane. When the aircraft landed at Seattle, Washington, Northwest Orient Airlines complied with his instructions. After he received the parachutes and the money, the hijacker allowed all passengers and two airline stewardesses to deplane..

He then ordered the remaining crew members into the first-class section of the aircraft and informed them he desired to fly to Mexico City. The hijacker instructed that the plane proceed in a southerly direction and fly at a low altitude and slow speed which would enable the rear door of the plane (Boeing 727) to be opened during the flight.

The hijacker apparently bailed out somewhere between Seattle, Washington, and Reno, Nevada, where the plane landed to refuel. It was determined the hijacker, two parachutes, and the ransom money had disappeared when the plane was inspected at Reno, Nevada.

Artist conception drawings of the aircraft hijacker were prepared by the Federal Bureau of Investigation Exhibit Section and are considered a reasonable likeness. The black and white composites were prepared initially, and some time later the color composites were prepared to depict the hijacker's complexion and age more graphically.

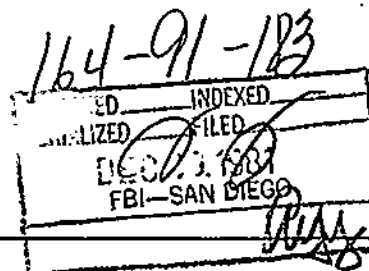

Comparison of the enclosed driver's license photograph does not disclose any marked resemblance to the artist's conception drawing of "D.B. Cooper".

On 1/25/82, [redacted] California, telephone number [redacted] was contacted relative to the information furnished in his letter to the Seattle Office referred to above. [redacted] stated that he was prompted to write the letter after viewing an "In Search Of" episode on television concerning "D.B. Cooper" in the captioned hijacking. In [redacted] estimation, the artist's conception drawing of "Cooper" reminded him of Clemens. He had no other reason than this believed resemblance to consider Clemens a suspect in the captioned matter, but believed that Clemens was a retired airline pilot, although he did not know for which airlines Clemens had flown. Clemens had never [redacted] of any paratrooper-type experience and was fairly tight-lipped regarding his personal life.
